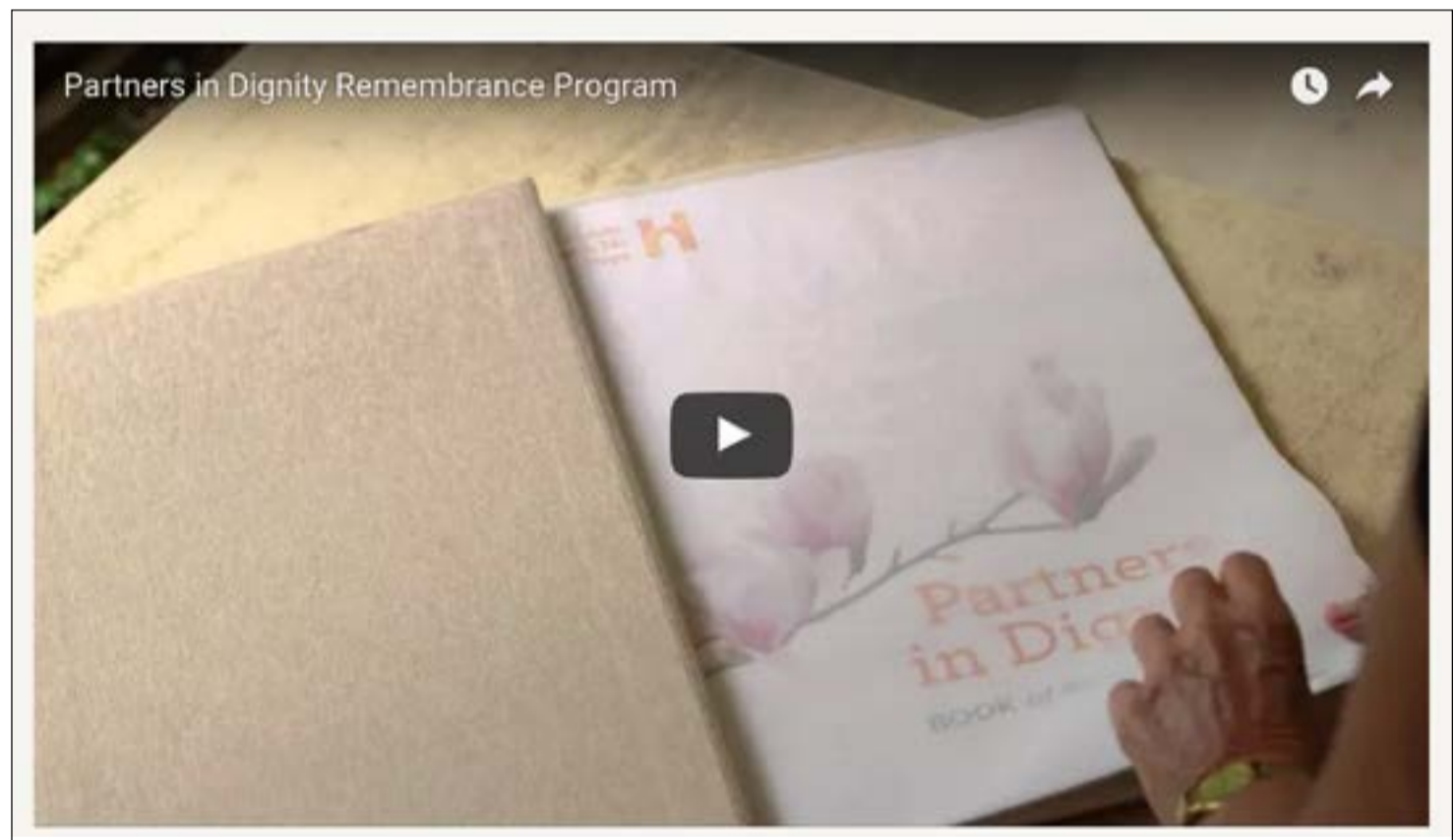

Lionel Watts  
1928 - 2000



## Founder of House with No Steps

---

Frank Lionel Watts, known as Lionel, was born on 20th December 1928.

In 1947, while stationed in Geelong Victoria during naval service, Lionel met his future bride, Dorothy, at a dance in the Palais Ballroom.

By 1956, aged 28, Lionel was enjoying life in Sydney with Dorothy and their two young daughters, Nicole and Kerry. He was employed by GJ Coles as an ambitious and dynamic Junior Executive Manager, with a promising career ahead. Little did they know, all this was about to change.

Later that year, Lionel contracted polio which left him with quadriplegia and weighing only 32kgs. He spent the next 2 years recovering at hospital.

“When I first became disabled, I looked around and I tried to find my way back into the community. I hadn’t really looked at my reflection and in my own mind I still considered myself as being fairly able, rather than disabled.”

Having been rejected by rehabilitation agencies on the grounds that he was “too badly handicapped ever to be rehabilitated” and unable to find employment, Lionel joined forces with other people with a disability to form the Motorised Wheelchair Club, later renamed The Wheelchair & Disabled Association of Australia. Lionel was quickly appointed as the Association’s first President.

Following a request from a member to find a ‘house with no steps’ to live in, the project was thereafter named House with No Steps.

In 1965, after 15 months of negotiations, the NSW State Government finally agreed to grant 2.5 acres of land at Belrose for the construction of the first House with No Steps. His early work with the organisation focused on establishing workshops which provided jobs for people with a disability, a wheelchair factory and independent living accommodation. Over the next 10 years, House with No Steps expanded into regional

NSW, ACT and Queensland, enabling people with disabilities to find suitable accommodation and employment within their own communities.

The next project was to help change Australia's building codes and architectural standards with the aim of eliminating architectural barriers for people with disabilities. In 1966, Lionel and Dorothy travelled the world researching what other nations were doing.

Based on what they found, Lionel, along with the Australian Council for Rehabilitation of Disabled (ACROD) and other organisations, lobbied the Federal and State Governments, The Institute of Architects, the Real Estate Institute of NSW, and other groups seeking a commitment to addressing these barriers.

In 1968, ACROD and its affiliates finally achieved their aim with the introduction of The Australian Standard Code of Design for Access by Handicapped Persons: Public Buildings and Facilities. These new laws focused on making day-to-day living easier including:

1. Mandatory wheelchair access to ALL public buildings via ramps (previously people either had to be carried up stairs, or enter via the delivery dock or kitchen).
2. The introduction of parking permits for the physically handicapped.

3. The mandatory inclusion of 'laybacks' (ramps) in footpaths and kerb crossings.

In 1969, Lionel was invited by President Nixon to attend the President's Committee on Rehabilitation in Washington. Over the following eight years, he was to attend five similar seminars. Also in 1969 Lionel received further recognition for his great contribution to the welfare of people with a disability by being awarded an M.B.E. in the New Year's Honours.

Later, in 1982, Lionel was appointed a Companion of the Order of St Michael and St George (CMG) in the Queen's Birthday Honours for his work in rehabilitation.

Sadly, Lionel Watts passed away on 17 October 2000; however, to this day, Lionel's legacy of providing dignity and purpose to those living with a disability continues on through the charity he founded, House with No Steps.

His determination and foresight as an advocate for people with a disability provides inspiration and guidance to the staff and eternal gratitude from those whose lives have been changed for the better. Today, and for years to come, we will continue to salute and thank Lionel Watts' all embracing love for his fellow human beings.

**Teuntje (& Johaane) Mieschke**  
**1925 - 2015**



Teuntje Geertruida, better known as Tony, was a caring lady with a big heart who always brought a smile to people's faces. She recently did an incredible thing by leaving a gift to House with No Steps in her Will.

"She was a lovely lady. She was kind and caring but she was also very stern and strong", said her close friend, Allan Vassallo.

Born in the Netherlands, Tony moved to Australia with her husband Johaane Christian Mieschke shortly after World War II. They first lived in an immigrant camp and after a while decided to call Narrabeen home.

Johaane worked as a carpenter and Tony found domestic work with a number of families in the area. Her reputation as a hard worker quickly earned her a position running the household of a wealthy Dutch family. She looked after their children, organised staff on the property and became a lifelong companion to her employer.

After trying for many years, Tony and Johaane were overjoyed at the birth of their son, Karl. He was their

only child - their true pride and joy, but sadly he died at the age of 26. A number of years later, Johaane also passed away at 72, on the 2nd May 1993.

After Johaane's passing, Tony was not lonely. She had a wonderful circle of close friends who looked after one another. One of whom was her former neighbour, Allan. Tony and Allan often spent their days taking long walks along Manly beach and speaking in their native Dutch language.

"She had battled so much in her life, especially with the loss of her son and her husband. She was an inspiration to me", said Allan.

After living the last few years of her life in a nursing home in Bayview, Tony passed away on 21st December 2015.

"Tony never built any skyscrapers or solved world affairs but she changed people's lives. She brought a smile to their faces and let them know that she cared - and those qualities are worth the world", said Allan.

**Louisa Blom**  
**1920 - 2015**



Louisa Blom was in many ways your ordinary Aussie battler who gave an extraordinary gift of hope and joy to people with a disability.

Louisa was born on 10th May, 1921 in Flaardingen, Holland and grew up in Glanebrug, close to the German border. Marrying Theo at 18, they had 8 children, one of whom died at the age of 6 months. This great loss was difficult for them to overcome but Louisa was a compassionate, strong willed and determined woman. This was not the only hurdle she had to surpass. It was war time and she was left at home looking after the children while her husband went to war. Fortunately, Theo returned and they were all able to move safely to Rotterdam.

Eventually, in 1958, looking for a better future for themselves and their family, Louisa, Theo and four of their children moved to Australia.

They lived for two years in a migrant camp in Richmond, NSW, before settling down in Bankstown.

Her greatest love was for those less fortunate than herself. She understood well from her personal experience that some people need more help than others and was determined to do something about it. She realised that even though she could only contribute in a small way at the time, she had the ability to contribute in a more significant way by planning for the future.

In this manner she could give and make a real difference in the lives of people with a disability. At the time that she wrote her Will she planned to leave a major legacy and an extraordinary Christmas gift by assigning the whole of her estate to House with No Steps.

**Victor Rudling**  
1945 - 2015



Victor Rudling 'Vic' was born on 2nd February 1945, in Fulham, a suburb of London, England, just after WWII. He was an identical twin brother to James, however having been born 40 minutes earlier. As youngsters, the twins were inseparable and that bond remained for a lifetime and beyond, although their journeys were very different. From their birth until the age of 16 they shared the same  $\frac{3}{4}$  bed, which was very hard, as James relates to us, both boys had reached almost six foot two by then.

Having migrated to Australia at the age of two their youth was spent in Wollongong, NSW. Vic was a highly skilled tradesman, hardworking and taking pride in his workmanship. He initially became an apprentice boilermaker and unable to join the RAAF, as his brother James, due to a hearing issue, he then continued on this path and travelled the world working hard and long in harsh places and conditions from the gas line in Alaska to the deserts of Australia. He was extremely principled and a loyal, considerate and devoted mate. Vic was fiercely

independent and self-reliant, yet always willing to lend a helping hand to those in need. He did so out of the goodness of his heart and not for any reward or returned favour. Everyone he knew was in his debt in this regard. Despite many hardships and setbacks, Vic played the cards he was dealt with courage and determination. He maintained a cheerful outlook, and he never lost his sense of humour.

"His needs in life were simple. He was neither pretentious nor self-centred, he was the most down to earth, genuine bloke one could possibly meet. Vic had a lot of empathy for people who through no fault of their own didn't have a chance in life. Through his compassion for others, he has bequeathed his entire estate to charity, to enhance the wellbeing of the most unfortunate" says his brother James.

House with No Steps is very grateful to have been a beneficiary of Vic's generous legacy which will allow for the continuation of its mission to create opportunities for people with a disability to make the most of their abilities.

Trygve Halvorsen  
1920 - 2014



It all started in Arendal, Norway in the 1920's and developed in Australia over a period of 94 years. It is the life of a yachting legend, a loving husband and father and generous benefactor of people with a disability.

Even as a teenager Trygve would race powerboats with his brothers and later on with his wife Noreen. Winning in 1945 the first trophy ever presented by Cruising Yacht Club of Australia, these were the early beginnings of a man who was later to become a most distinguished, accomplished and celebrated master boat builder, designer and consultant. With him we have lost the last surviving member of the first 1962 American Cup Challenge Committee and a well-known yachtsman who held a series of still undefeated Sydney-Hobart wins on Freya - his most famous cruising and ocean-racing yacht design. A true yachting legend! He was awarded the Australian Sports Medal in 2000.

Trygve's life was also intertwined with his love for his family and his concern for others. As such, for more than thirty years he was a staunch and loving supporter of House with No Steps. He gave freely from his heart.

His love for yachting and his desire to help others will always be remembered. This legacy of giving through many different gifts to House with No Steps will never be forgotten by all those whose lives he helped change for the better.

Today, we pay tribute to a true Benefactor of House with No Steps and a loving family man. Father to Erica and Nina, dedicated husband to Noreen, brother to Magnus and uncle to his many nieces and nephews.

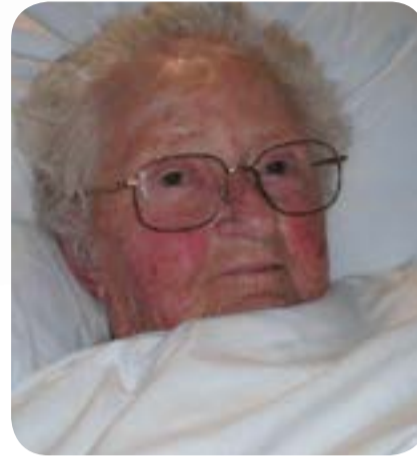

John went to live at the Dalmar Children's Home in 1948 until the age of 16, when he was fostered by James and Mary Pincott from Beecroft. He had befriended their son Michael while attending Carlingford Public School and although they already had eight children, they welcomed him into their family.

John worked as a plumber and drainer throughout Australia. Although he never married, he made lifelong friends in the various towns and cities where he lived. He loved Rugby League, especially the Canterbury Bulldogs and his prized possession was a jersey signed by Terry Lamb.

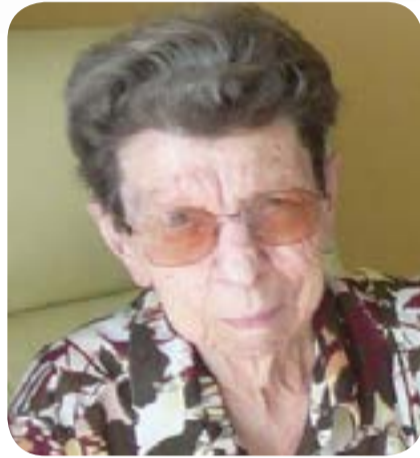

She was also a staunch monarchist.

Pam had a distinguished career at the Bank of New South Wales and then Westpac. She made several astute investments throughout her career and thus was able to benefit a number of worthy causes including House with No Steps.

Pam was a very active member of the community. She was the Secretary to the Friends of Australian Opera group and an active member of the Strathfield

Golf Club as well as having many friends in the Strathfield community and beyond.

1918 - 2007



Dorothy McCallum (later Carthew) was born in London, England in 1918. She met Ted Carthew, who was born in Stawell, Victoria in 1910 after he was transferred by the Bank of New South Wales to their London office. They were married in England during World War II and they both arrived in Australia in 1948.

They had a long and happy marriage with Ted continuing to work for the Bank of New South Wales now Westpac, until his retirement in 1974.

Dorothy was a loving person who kept in touch with many friends and did volunteer work. Ted died in 2003 and Dorothy in 2007, aged 89. They had no children and few close relatives. They were very generous in their giving to others.

Lynette Axford related to us that Dorothy was a lovely Godmother. Even though Dorothy lived in Sydney and Lynette lived in Melbourne Dorothy always remembered Lynette's birthday and sent her a present which never failed to delight.

Dorothy passed away on 9th November 2007 having been preceded by her husband Ted. From their generous gifting to numerous charities, including House with No Steps, we can say with certainty that Dorothy was not only a very generous and thoughtful person, but she showed great love and concern for people with a disability.

**Robert Edward Knapp**  
**1931 - 2004**



Robert Edward Knapp was born on 25th January 1931, the only child of Jim and Ena Knapp. The family ran a beef cattle enterprise at Bentley, a rural area some 10km from both Lismore and Casino.

At the age of 19 Bob contracted polio which left him unable to walk without callipers and walking sticks. This put an end to his then active life of playing cricket and tennis.

The staff at the Brisbane hospital suggested to Jim that Bob needed some mental activity and that he would be suited to clerical work. Jim walked Lismore and Casino calling on offices where Bob could get some unpaid experience.

John Downs, a principal of the accounting firm J.W. Douglass Gilder & Co gave Bob that start. The year was 1954. After a short period of training Bob was offered and accepted a full time position with the firm.

Bob took to the routine of the accounting world as if he was born to it. Although he held no formal qualifications he acquired through experience a sound understanding of bookkeeping, income tax, business

analysis and associated issues. He continued to work in the same accounting practice for 45 years finally retiring in July 1999.

In retirement he settled down to a life of an aged bachelor. His parents had died and he used the services of an aged care home service to assist him with domestic issues.

In early 2004 he had a fall at home which resulted in a fracture. He was hospitalised in Lismore and commenced a rehabilitation course. Bob was told by the medical staff that he would not be able to live independently, he was dead some five days later the 5th May 2004.

Bob divided his estate between six organisations including House with No Steps with each receiving in excess of \$350,000.

Paul Mulherin, friend and colleague has related to us this story of Robert's life.

Thank you Bob! Most of those who benefited from this act did not meet you personally but you can rest assured that everyone at House with No Steps deeply appreciates your generosity which was translated into improvements for the Café at House with No Steps Summerland House Farm.

**Clare Grant Stevenson**

**AM, MBE, BEd**

**1903 - 1998**



Born 18th July 1903 in Wangaratta, Victoria, Australia Died 22nd October 1988. Occupation: Bureaucrat, Servicewoman and Community worker.

Clare Stevenson was appointed Director of the Women's Auxiliary Australian Air Force on 9th June 1941. Thus she became head of the first Women's Service formed in Australia for ground-staff duties with an armed force. After the war Stevenson returned to her executive position with Berlei Ltd.

Also she became involved with community work. For forty years she was affiliated with the Services Canteens Trust Fund. Clare Stevenson, with a group of friends, helped initiate the Scholarship Trust Fund for Civilian Widows' Children.

She also helped establish the Kings Cross Community Aid Centre as well as the Carers Association of New South Wales.

On 11th June 1960 Clare Stevenson was appointed a Member of the Order of the British Empire for social welfare services on behalf of ex-servicewomen. On Australia Day 1988 she received the Member of the Order of Australia award for service to the community and to the welfare of veterans.

Clare was an active member of the House with No Steps Auxiliary. It was her desire to support this cause beyond her own lifetime. In her Will she bequeathed to House with No Steps her beachside property at Narrabeen, NSW.

## Leonard Watson Chant 1904 - 1979

The late Leonard Watson Chant was born in South Australia in 1904 and died the 22nd December 1979.

Leonard's parents were John W. Chant and Sarah J. (Randall) Chant who lived in South Australia about the time Leonard was born.

Leonard had six siblings: two brothers (who both died at a young age) and four sisters.

We know little more about his life but for the fact that he left a significant part of his Estate, namely his home in Bellevue Hill, for his sister Olive (nee Chant) Humphris to live in. Olive also continued for the rest of her own life to be a staunch supporter of House with No Steps.

When Olive passed away in 2005 the house was sold and House with No Steps was the recipient of 20% of Leonard's Estate.

Our records reveal that Leonard is the largest known single benefactor of House with No Steps, so we owe a great deal to him and his sister Olive.

Leonard and Olive Chant showed great love and thoughtfulness for people with a disability. They knew that their legacy could mean that opportunities would be created for many, beyond their own lifetime. We today pay testimony that their significant legacy has made a great difference to many.

We salute the late Leonard Chant!
